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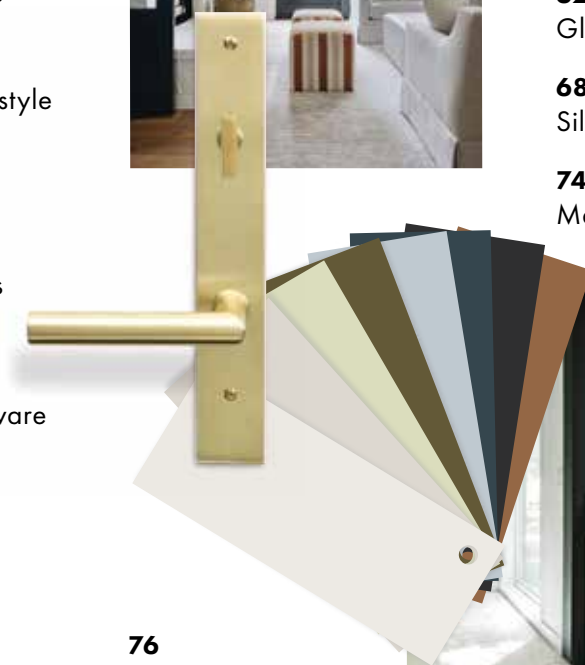

3 QUESTIONS TO HELP YOU DREAM UP YOUR IDEAL PATIO DOOR

Before we get into patio door selection, we encourage you to take a minute to imagine what your door could do for your home. This will help you get into the right mindset before diving into the details.

1 HOW COULD THE PATIO DOOR MAKE YOUR HOME FLOW BETTER?

Maybe you need two panels where there's currently only one. Maybe you need a door where there's currently a window. Or, maybe you want to open up an entire wall. Any of the above are possible!

2 WHAT ARE YOU TRYING TO ACCESS OUTSIDE?

Your garden, patio, pool, outdoor kitchen — whatever it may be, the right door could make it more seamless depending on opening style, size, and more.

By connecting indoor and outdoor kitchens, this E-Series Hinged Patio Door makes serious cooking projects and entertaining easy. Just what pro remodeler and HGTV host Laurie March had in mind when she remodeled her home for better indoor/outdoor living.

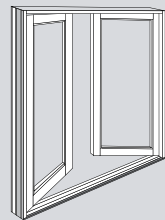
3 WHAT KIND OF EXPERIENCE DO YOU WANT TO CREATE?

Maybe you've just invested in a new patio, and you want to make the most of it with an improved connection; or maybe you want to go a step further and create an indoor/outdoor living room.

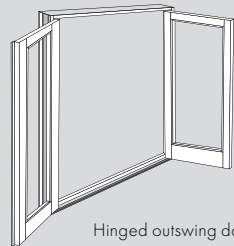

DOOR TYPES

This is where you start when picking out a door. How does it open? How big is it? Where is it typically used? We'll introduce you to the different types of doors available.

WHAT: A door with one or more panels that swing on a hinge, opening inward or outward.

WHERE: Often, but not exclusively, found in more-traditional homes.

FUN FACT: Two-panel hinged patio doors might be the standard, but they're not the only option. We have single-panel and three-panel configurations available too.

GET IT: Hinged patio doors are available through the 200 Series, 400 Series, A-Series, and E-Series product lines. See a comparison chart of these options on pages 76-77.



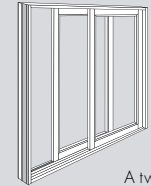
Gliding patio door (Sliding patio door)

WHAT: A door with two (or more) panels that slide parallel with a wall.

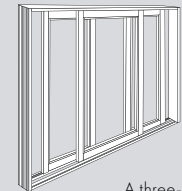
WHERE: Found in more-modern homes or anywhere there isn't space for a door to swing open.

FUN FACT: Our gliding patio doors can have two, three, or four panels, so there are lots of ways to customize these doors and let in the light.

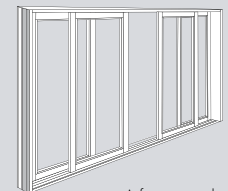
GET IT: Gliding patio doors are available through all five of our product lines, including the 100 Series, 200 Series, 400 Series, A-Series, and E-Series. Compare these options on pages 76-77.



A two-panel gliding patio door has one moving and one non-moving (stationary) panel.



A three-panel gliding patio door has a stationary panel in the center, and moving panels on both the left and right.



A four-panel gliding patio door opens from the center (bi-parting), so the two center panels move and the two outside panels are stationary.



WHAT'S A FRENCH DOOR?

"French doors" are a common way to refer to hinged doors, but it's not quite that simple — while French doors are typically hinged, not all hinged doors are French doors. A French door refers to a specific panel style — a taller bottom rail (part beneath the glass), wider stiles (vertical parts next to the glass), and possibly grilles on the glass.



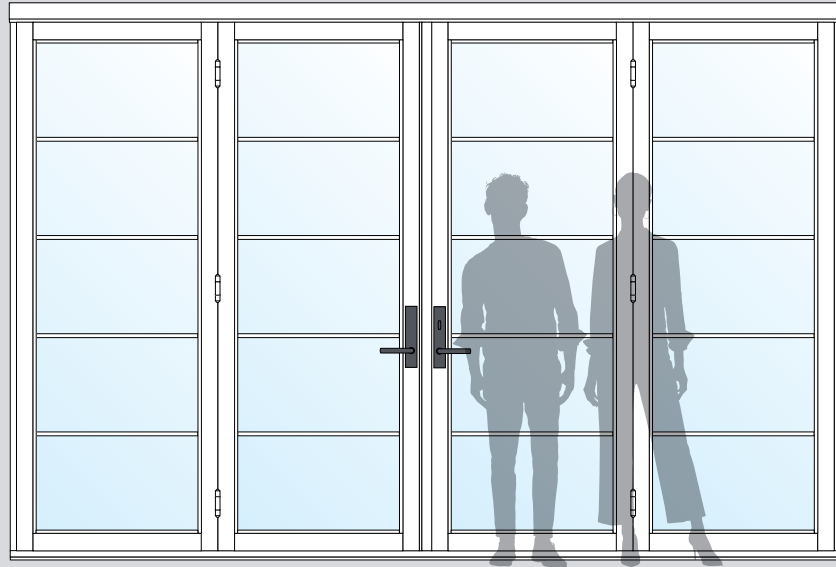
THIRD PANEL'S THE CHARM!

Our A-Series Gliding Patio Doors give you the ability to add a third, center panel to your door, which can make a big difference in the flow and brightness of your home. With this configuration, the center panel can be wider than the left and right panels. These flanking panels both move while the center panel remains stationary.

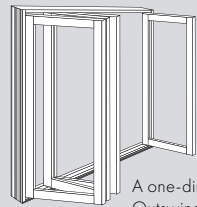
UNDERSTANDING PATIO DOOR OPTIONS

BIG DOORS

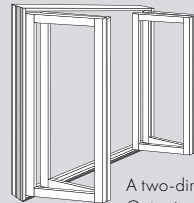
This is what we call our oversized patio doors. They can simply be larger versions of patio doors or so big that they're essentially moving glass walls. If you're looking for a next-level patio door, here are your options:



Single-panel operating door (also called a "daily door")



A one-direction Folding Outswing Door can open from the right or the left with the option to add a single-panel door that operates independently.



A two-direction Folding Outswing Door opens from the center and can have up to 16 total panels, which can be divided evenly or unevenly on either side of the opening.

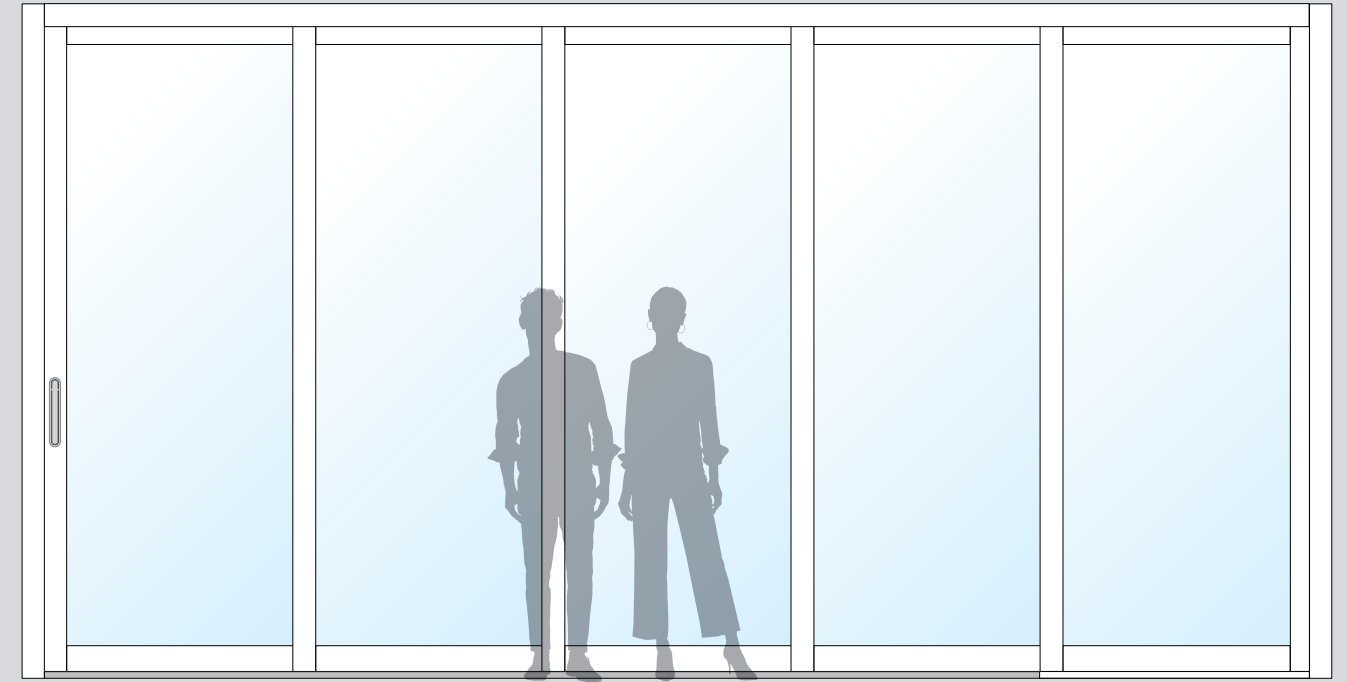
Folding Outswing Door (bi-folding door)

WHAT: A door made of hinged panels that accordion open and together create a large, unobstructed opening.

WHERE: Anywhere you want to open up a whole wall and a popular choice in a remodel since it can be installed in an existing wall.

FUN FACT: This bi-folding door can wrap around a corner for two walls of glass.

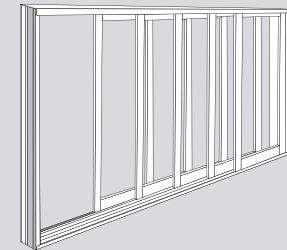
Multi-Slide Door

WHAT: Our completely aluminum sliding door is designed to accommodate large openings up to 12 feet tall.

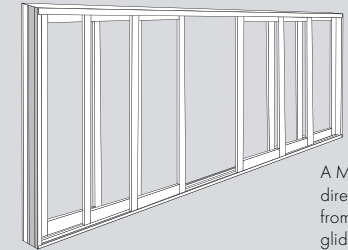
WHERE: Ideally suited for desert locales and contemporary homes due to its material and styling.*

FUN FACT: This door comes in a variety of configurations: pocketing, one- and two-directional stacking, double active, and corners.**

Q: AREN'T THESE DOORS JUST FOR CALIFORNIA HOMES?

A: Nope! Big doors can work in any climate. In fact, we see these doors installed in homes across the country. We'll explain more about how to pick the right option for your climate in the "Selecting for Performance" section, but here's the quick answer: Glass, sills, and materials all play a role in equipping a door to perform in various climates. The Folding Outswing Door comes with the option to include a single panel that operates as a separate door, so you can use it when you don't want to open up the full wall in the cold season. And, of course, insect screens are an option where needed.

WHAT'S A POCKETING DOOR?

A pocketing door disappears into your wall when open. It's an elegant solution for creating a completely unobstructed opening, and it can save on space. Find this option available with the Multi-Slide Door, MultiGlide™ Door, and Liftslide Door.

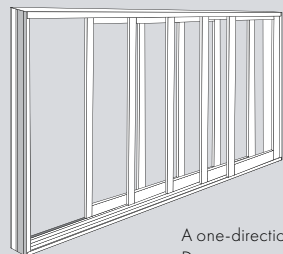

WHAT: An extra-large sliding door that can disappear into the wall, completely opening the space — up to 10 feet tall and 50 feet wide!

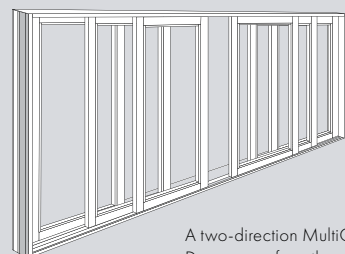
WHERE: Anywhere you want to create an indoor/outdoor living area without giving up an inch of space.

FUN FACT: This door can be automated so it will open and close with the touch of a button.

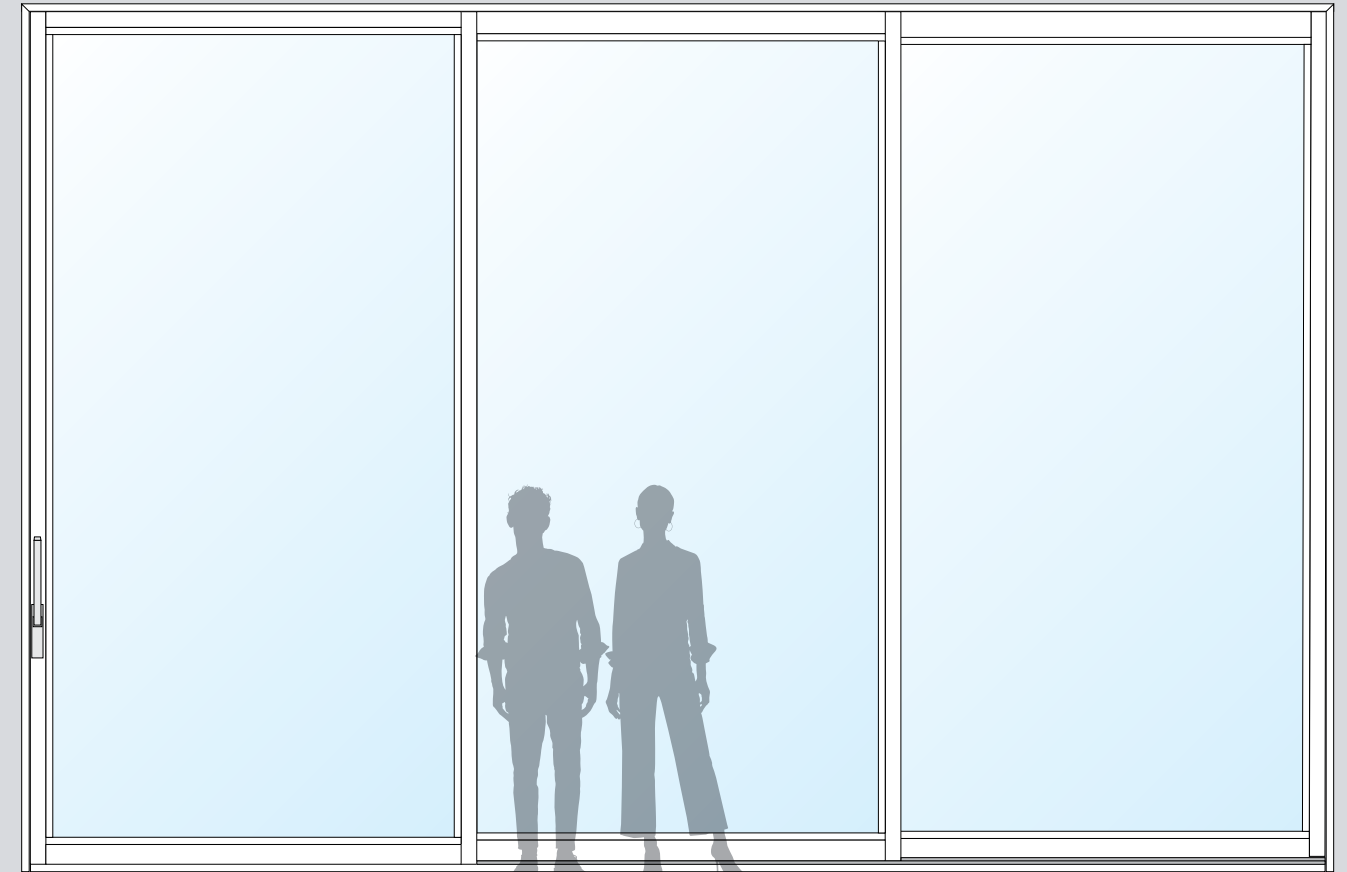

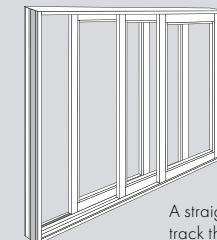
Liftslide Door

WHAT: Our premier moving glass wall system, this door is precision engineered for nearly effortless operation and truly massive sizes.

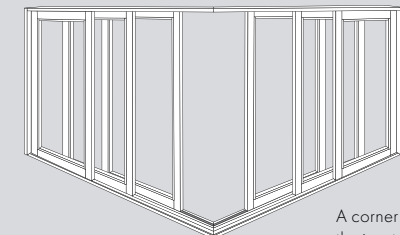
WHERE: Anywhere you want the biggest or most luxurious indoor/outdoor experience, this door can be up to 16 feet tall and 60 feet wide.

FUN FACT: This door can even curve! Curved Liftslide Doors have all the capabilities of straight Liftslide Doors.

UNDERSTANDING PATIO DOOR OPTIONS

Q: A BIG DOOR WON'T WORK IN MY HOME. HOW CAN I CREATE A SIMILAR EFFECT?

A: Try one of these three approaches for increasing the amount of glass while sticking with a traditional patio door:



1 ADD ON

A window can be added above the door (transom), next to the door (sidelight), or you can go all out by adding an extra panel (or panels). All of the above were added to the E-Series Gliding Patio Door in this bedroom.

How to get the look: Your builder can attach transoms and sidelights to your patio door when you order from the 100 Series, 200 Series, 400 Series, or A-Series. For patio doors that go beyond two panels, look to the 200 Series, 400 Series, A-Series, or E-Series.



2 SIZE UP

A 10-foot tall patio door, or a door that's about two feet taller than your average ceiling height, will give you a big door feel without the big door. So if you've got the height, go for it!

How to get the look: Select from the A-Series product line, which offers our largest patio door sizes.



3 PICK BI-PARTING

A four-panel patio door that opens from the center and includes two stationary panels on either side of the moving panels will expand your glass while minimizing the amount of tracking on the floor.

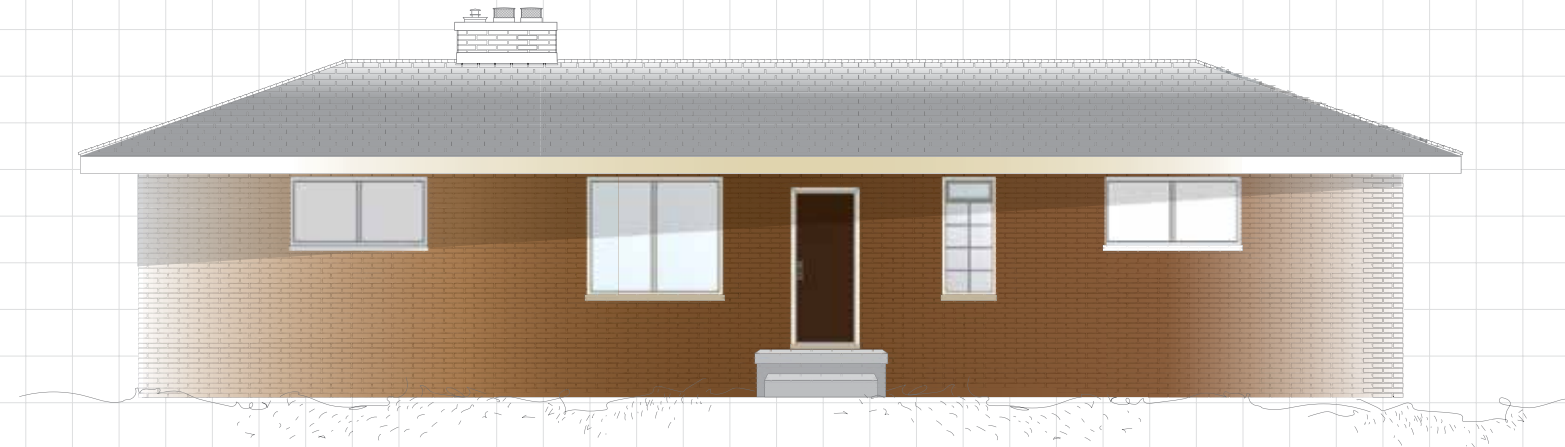

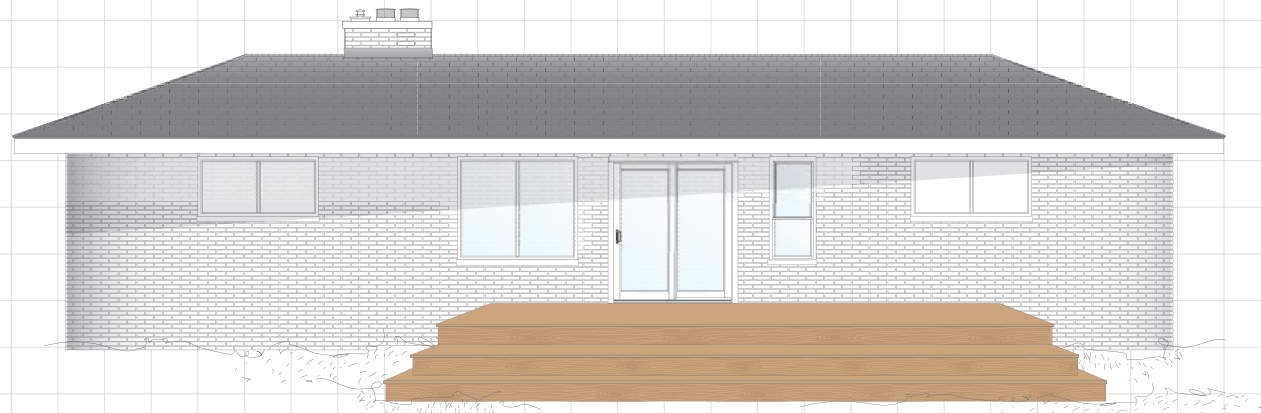

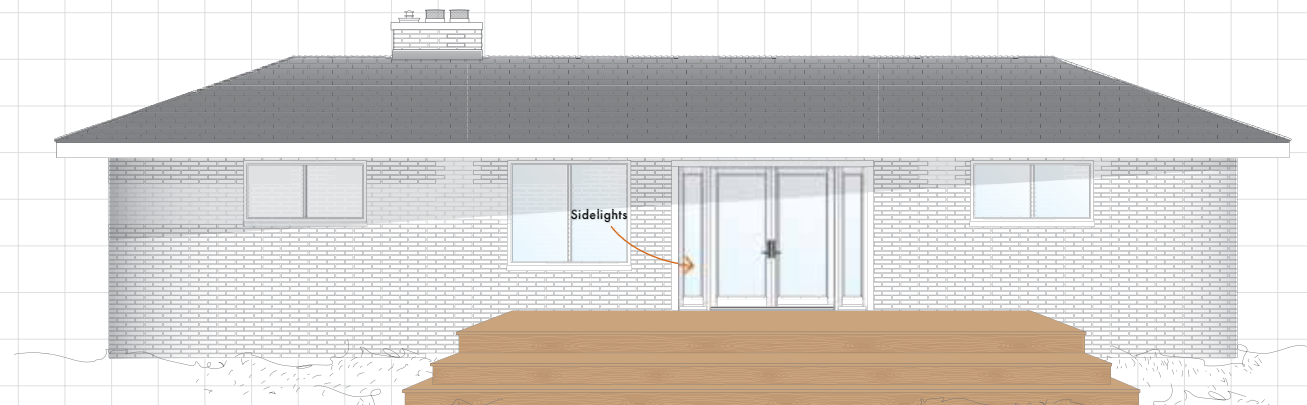
Sometimes a two-panel patio door is the perfect solution, but it's important to know that it's not the *only* solution. In fact, today's patio doors can size up in all sorts of ways. If you're thinking about adding windows next to a door, you could add sidelights, or you could take it a step further by adding extra panels to mimic the effect of floor-to-ceiling windows. And if you really want to go for it, there are the extra-large solutions available with our big door options, like Folding Outswing Doors and more.



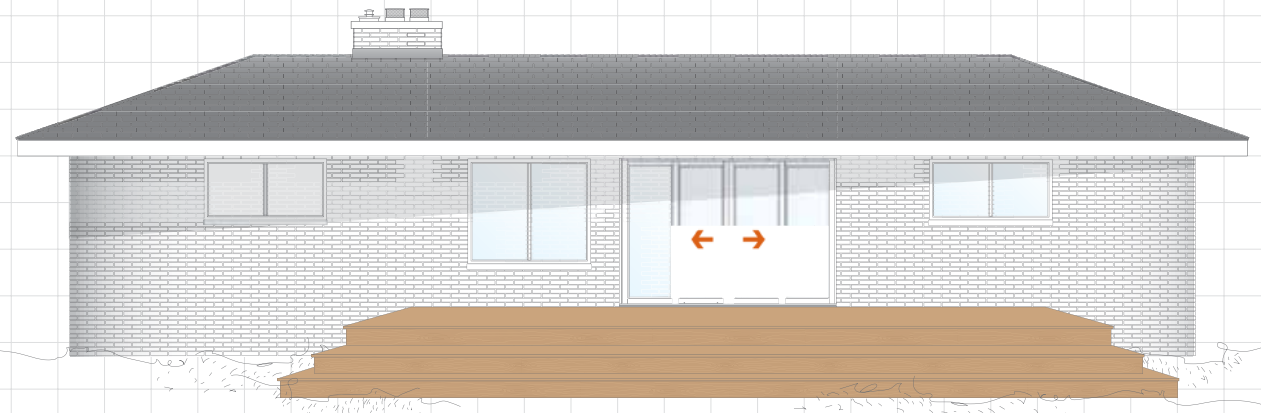

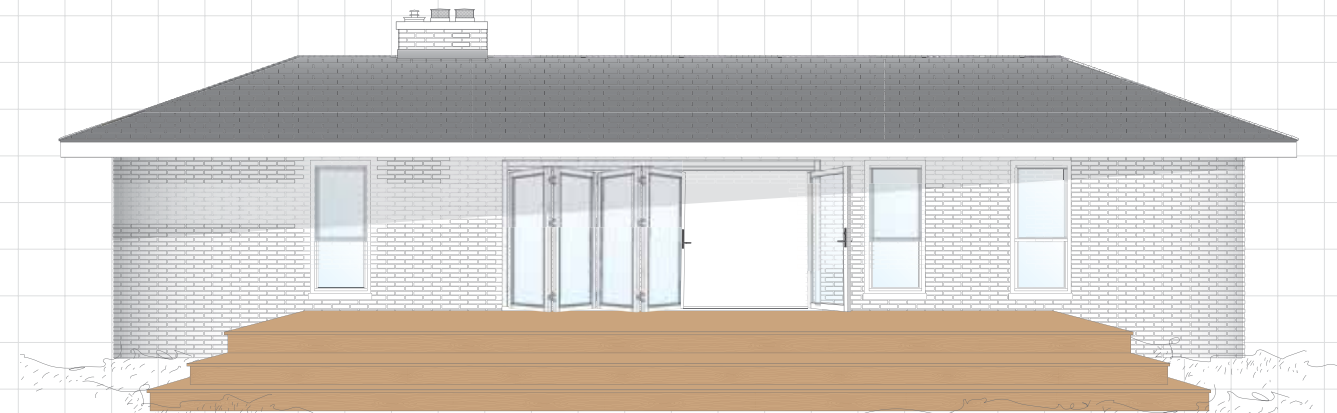
SMALL: A two-panel gliding patio door is sleek and brings in lots of light!



MEDIUM: A hinged patio door with sidelights (windows next to the door) ushers in even more light.



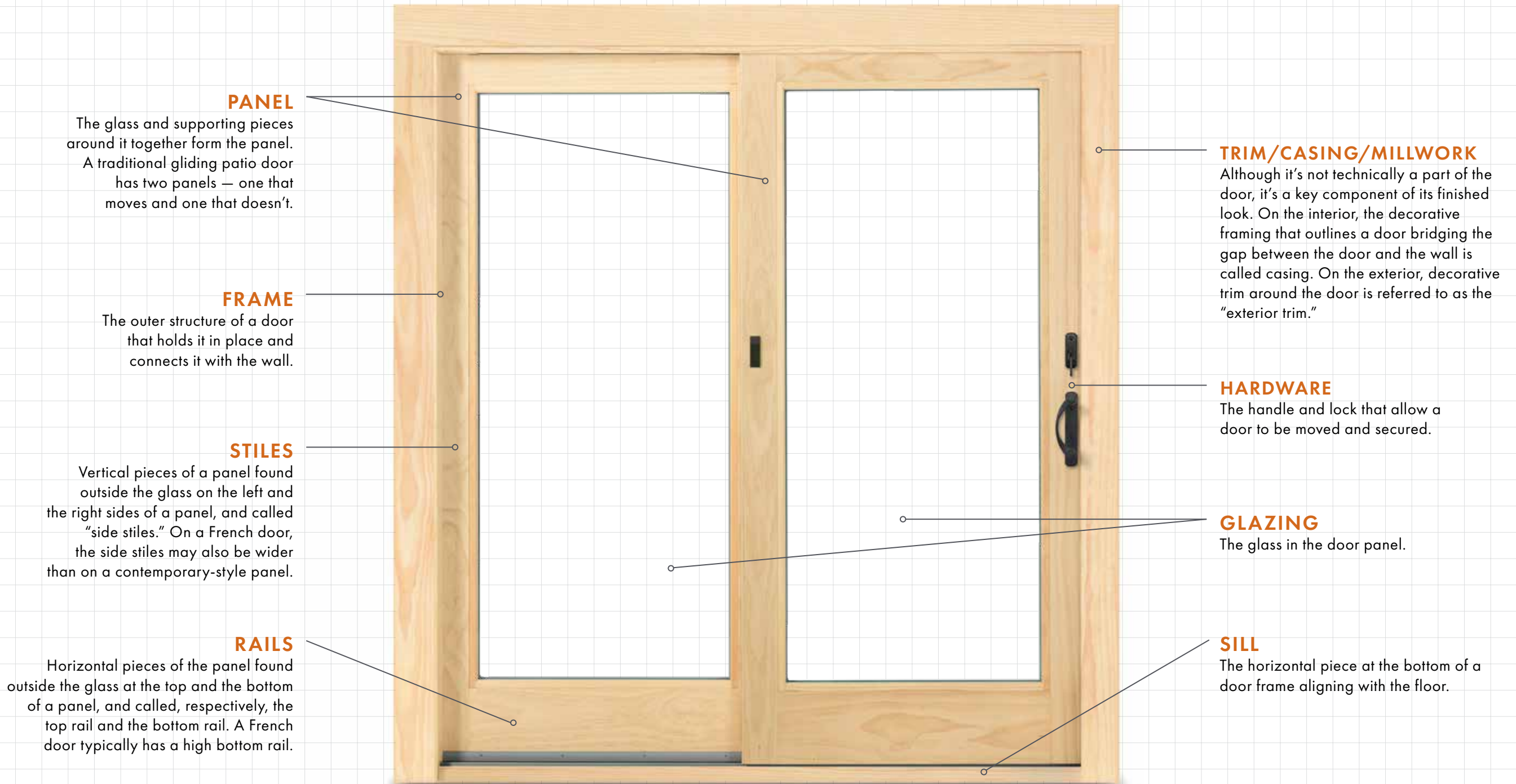
LARGE: A four-panel gliding patio door mimics the effect of floor-to-ceiling windows.



X-LARGE: For the most glass and an unobstructed opening, choose a big door like this Folding Outswing Door.

PARTS OF A PATIO DOOR

Knowing what to call each part of the door will help you identify the features you like, and communicate clearly with your pro throughout the selection and installation process.



PANEL

The glass and supporting pieces around it together form the panel. A traditional gliding patio door has two panels — one that moves and one that doesn't.

FRAME

The outer structure of a door that holds it in place and connects it with the wall.

STILES

Vertical pieces of a panel found outside the glass on the left and the right sides of a panel, and called "side stiles." On a French door, the side stiles may also be wider than on a contemporary-style panel.

RAILS

Horizontal pieces of the panel found outside the glass at the top and the bottom of a panel, and called, respectively, the top rail and the bottom rail. A French door typically has a high bottom rail.

TRIM/CASING/MILLWORK

Although it's not technically a part of the door, it's a key component of its finished look. On the interior, the decorative framing that outlines a door bridging the gap between the door and the wall is called casing. On the exterior, decorative trim around the door is referred to as the "exterior trim."

HARDWARE

The handle and lock that allow a door to be moved and secured.

GLAZING

The glass in the door panel.

SILL

The horizontal piece at the bottom of a door frame aligning with the floor.

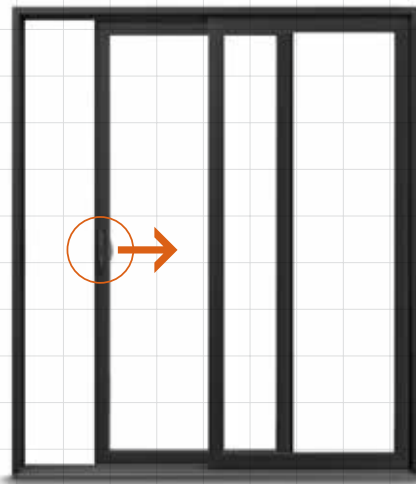

TALK LIKE A PRO: HANDING

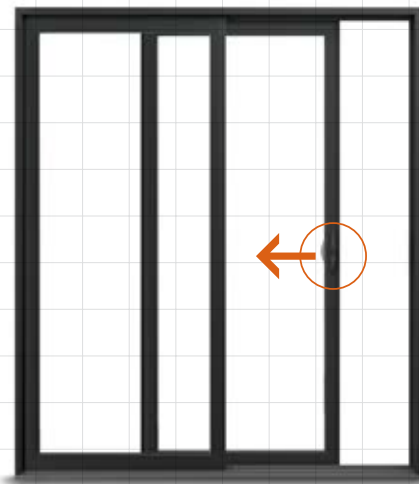
Handing is a term to describe the direction a door opens (from the left or right). This can make a big difference in how it feels to move through your home. But before you decide on a handing direction for a door, it's important to know two things. One: Handing is always described from an exterior perspective, so imagine standing outside your home when thinking about handing direction. Two: The handing side for gliding doors is the side the hardware is on; but for hinged doors, it's the side the hinges are on. Still confused? We don't blame you! Check the illustrations below and ask a pro before buying just be sure, because handing cannot be reversed after install.

EXTERIOR VIEW



LEFT-HANDED GLIDING

The hardware is on the left side of the moving (active) panel, so a two-panel door like this would open from the left.



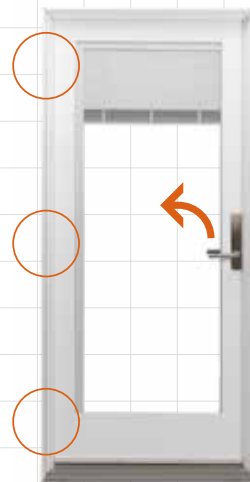
RIGHT-HANDED GLIDING

The hardware is on the right side of the moving (active) panel, so a two-panel door like this would open from the right.

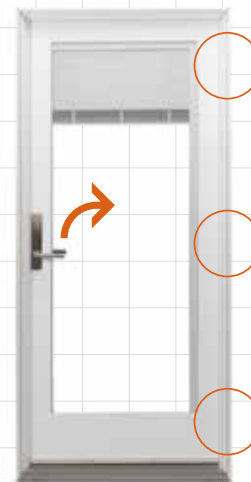
LEFT-HANDED HINGED

The hinges are on the left side of the panel, so a single-panel door like this would open from the right

1 EXTERIOR KEYED LOCK

Available with all patio doors



Lock your patio door from the exterior instead of just the interior.

2 AUXILIARY FOOT LOCK

Available with all gliding patio doors



Keep your gliding door in a closed or partially open position with this lock.

3 MULTI-POINT LOCK

Available with A-Series, E-Series, and some 400 Series patio doors



Enhance security and add weather-tightness with a locking system incorporating multiple mechanisms.

4 YALE® ASSURE LOCK®*

Available with A-Series and E-Series Hinged Patio Doors and Folding Outswing Doors

3 DOOR FAQs ANSWERED

1 Q: CAN I GET AN INSECT SCREEN WITH MY PATIO DOOR?

A: Yes! We have two options: a panel or a retractable insect screen. Panel insect screens align with door panels, and hinge or slide along a track; whereas retractable insect screens are pulled open when needed and coil into a canister when not in use. Exact options will depend on the door and configuration chosen.



This A-Series Gliding Patio Door with contemporary panels and a bi-parting opening has a retractable insect screen that hides neatly away when not in use so it doesn't obstruct the view!

2 Q: ARE THERE PATIO DOOR SILLS THAT ARE EASIER TO STEP OR ROLL OVER?

A: If you're looking for a sill that's minimal in height, we have low-threshold sills available with our E-Series Hinged Patio Door and 200 Series Hinged Patio Door.



3 Q: CAN I CHOOSE WHETHER MY PATIO DOOR OPENS INWARD OR OUTWARD?

A: You sure can. Hinged doors that open outward are called outswing, and hinged doors that open inward are called inswing. When you order your door, you can decide which way your door will open. To make the best decision, consider the flow of your home. For example, an outswing door could be a good choice if you want the double opening a hinged door provides, yet an inswing door would create an interior obstruction.



There was space to accommodate this E-Series Hinged Inswing Patio Door inside this bedroom where it doesn't interfere with passage along the deck outside.



This E-Series Hinged Outswing Patio Door avoids taking away space from the Accessory Dwelling Unit's interior while also letting in lots of light through its four panels.

CREATING A LOOK

HOW TO PICK A PATIO DOOR THAT SUITS YOUR STYLE

Even the most confident among us can become overwhelmed when faced with a decision we'll be living with for decades. So before we get into the details of panel style, color, grilles, and hardware, take a minute to read through the advice below. It's our approach to strategically breaking down a big decision:

1 FOCUS YOUR INSPIRATION

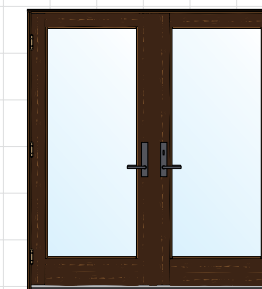
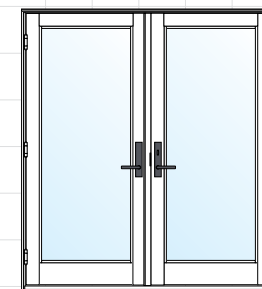
You don't have to start from scratch when picking out your new door's style. You can look to your home's architecture for guidance. Searching for doors that suit your home's Victorian or Mid-Century Modern style will help you avoid information overload. If your home doesn't have a distinct architectural style, you can think about things like your home's scale and the era in which it was built. From there, you can find a style that will be a good match and hopefully inspire you.

As you look through inspirational images, take note of details like:

- Glass: Is it expansive, or is it balanced by the framing around it?
- Color: Are you seeing certain colors repeated?
- Grilles: Are you noticing them? If so, what pattern is typical?
- Hardware: Is it prominent or does it tend to blend in? What finishes are common?

2 MAKE BIG DECISIONS FIRST

This section starts with panel styles on purpose. Your door's panel style will have the most impact on its final look. Starting with bigger decisions before moving on to more detailed decisions can naturally narrow down your options. If you pick a traditional panel style, you might decide that you want to go with a stained wood or a historic color that's closely associated with your home style. To keep the look going, you might choose grilles. By the time you decide on hardware, it'll be clear that you're looking for a more ornate style to go with the rest of your traditional door.



PANEL STYLES

Door panels aren't all alike. Subtle design differences can combine to create a certain look. When you're deciding on a door option, its panel style is a good place to start.

WHAT MAKES IT CONTEMPORARY?

The narrow rails and stiles are an even width all the way around, allowing for a larger expanse of glass — a key element of modern design. In addition, details are simple, with right angles, clean lines, and no grilles.

WHAT MAKES IT TRADITIONAL?

The high bottom rail gives this door a more traditional profile, as do the grilles, since historically doors with lots of glass were more challenging to make. Panel details and grille options veer more ornate with curves and other flourishes.

Q: WHAT IF I WANT A LOOK THAT'S IN BETWEEN CONTEMPORARY AND TRADITIONAL?

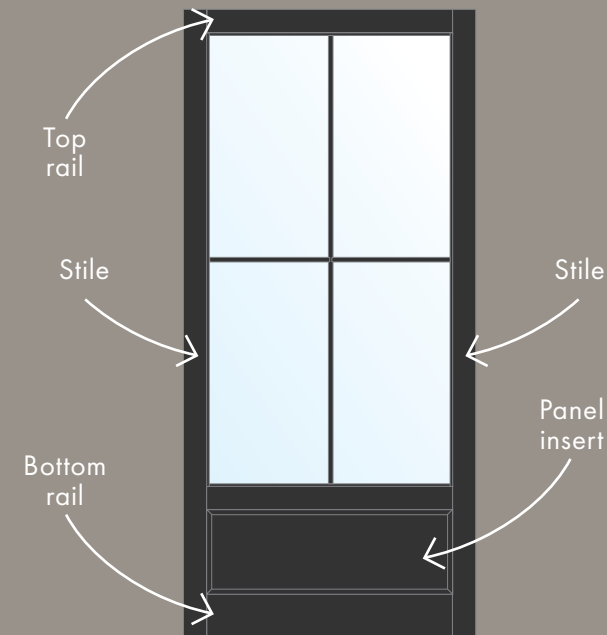
A: It's possible to create a look that splits the difference. In fact, transitional style blending traditional and contemporary features is one of the most popular trends in home design today. If you're considering a two-panel patio door, remember that hinged doors are typically more traditional and gliding doors more contemporary. So you could pick a panel style that contrasts with the type of door. For example, the more traditional hinged door with a contemporary panel. Then accentuate the look with hardware, color or wood stain, and other elements. We'll explain what makes these other selections lean traditional versus contemporary in the following sections.



Cass Makes Home blogger Cass Smith chose an A-Series Hinged Patio Door with traditional panels, but then added contemporary elements through the black color and modern FSB® hardware. Cool fact: Her door has privacy built in with blinds-between-the-glass.

TALK LIKE A PRO: SIGHT LINES

When you want to see more of the view, you might seek out a door that has narrower rails and stiles — or to put it simply, more glass and less framing around it. A door like this might be described as having narrow sight lines. Another time you'll want to consider sight lines is when you have windows and a door next to each other. If the door is mostly glass, it'll be especially desirable if its rails and stiles match the windows'. When discussing doors with an architect or designer, this is a useful term to know. If you're acting as your own designer, this is a detail you'll want to consider, particularly if you're matching your new door to existing windows. It may seem like a minor detail, but it's one that creates a polished look — see what we mean below.



The E-Series Gliding Patio Door at the back of this room was customized to match the interior doors. The stiles are the same width, and the rails are the same height. A wooden insert was also added at the bottom of each panel. As our most customizable product line, E-Series allows you the freedom to create your own perfect patio door panel.

CREATING A LOOK

PICKING A PANEL CHEAT SHEET

Need some help choosing? Here's a go-to option from each category:

CONTEMPORARY



The 200 Series Narroline® Gliding Patio Door has a sleek, narrow profile at a friendly price point. For a similar look but more customization, try the E-Series Gliding Patio Door.

TRADITIONAL



The 400 Series Hinged Patio Door and the A-Series Hinged Patio Door with a traditional panel both have French-door styling with a high bottom rail and thicker stiles. And, of course, you can add grilles.

TRANSITIONAL



The A-Series allows you to choose either a contemporary or a traditional panel. You can also choose either option with our Folding Outswing Door. Then make other selections to further your desired look.

Q: HOW CAN I ADD A LOT OF GLASS WHILE ALSO KEEPING A TRADITIONAL LOOK?

A: Try repeated sets of hinged patio doors. It's classic, and at the same time bright and airy.



CREATING A LOOK

Q: HOW DO I PICK OUT A REPLACEMENT PATIO DOOR?

A: We all love to dream about remodeling our homes in one go, but it's not always reality. So if you find yourself in the position of replacing a patio door as a standalone project, here are a couple things to keep in mind:

1 WILL YOU BE REPLACING YOUR WINDOWS EVENTUALLY?

If so, you should select the door that matches your long-term vision for your home rather than your existing windows. This will move your remodeling dreams forward and save you money in the long run.

2 IS YOUR HOME MORE CONTEMPORARY OR MORE TRADITIONAL?

The type of door and the door's panel style are big decisions that can help create the right look. For example, a gliding door with a contemporary panel on a Mid-Century Modern home.

3 WHAT'S THE PATIO DOOR'S ROLE ON YOUR EXTERIOR?

Is the door the main attraction, or is it a supporting player? If the former, you could go for a bold accent color. If the latter, you might want it to match your window colors.

COLOR

Doors are a long-lasting element, but picking out a color doesn't have to be intimidating. When selecting color, you have options. Here's what you should know and when you might choose one option over another:

- If you want a door that's ready to install, a factory-finished door comes with the paint or wood stain already applied.
- If you're replacing a door and want it to match your existing woodwork, an unfinished door can be painted or stained by your contractor for a perfect match.
- If you want a custom color, pick up a fan deck from Sherwin-Williams. We can finish big doors and E-Series patio doors in any color from their portfolio.

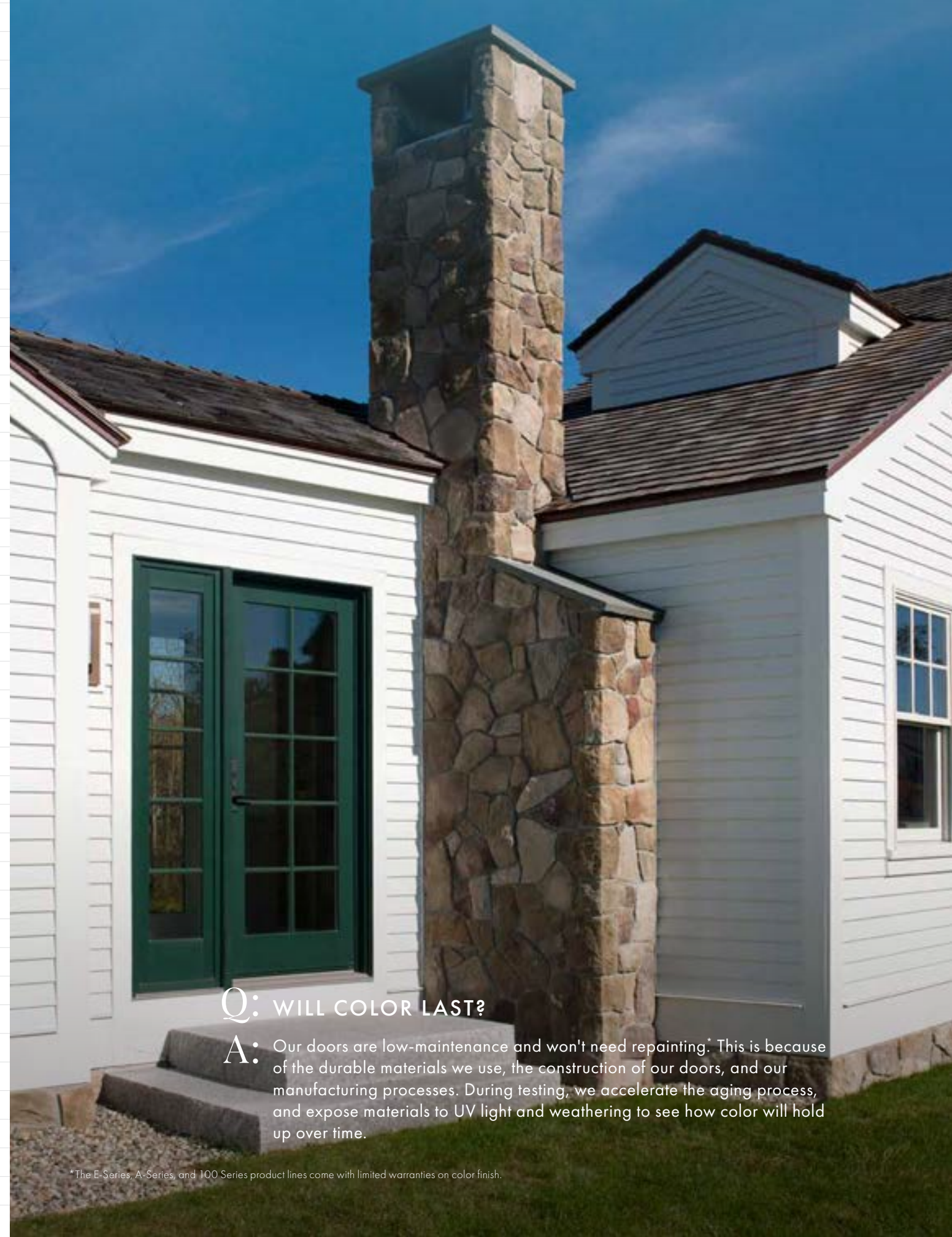

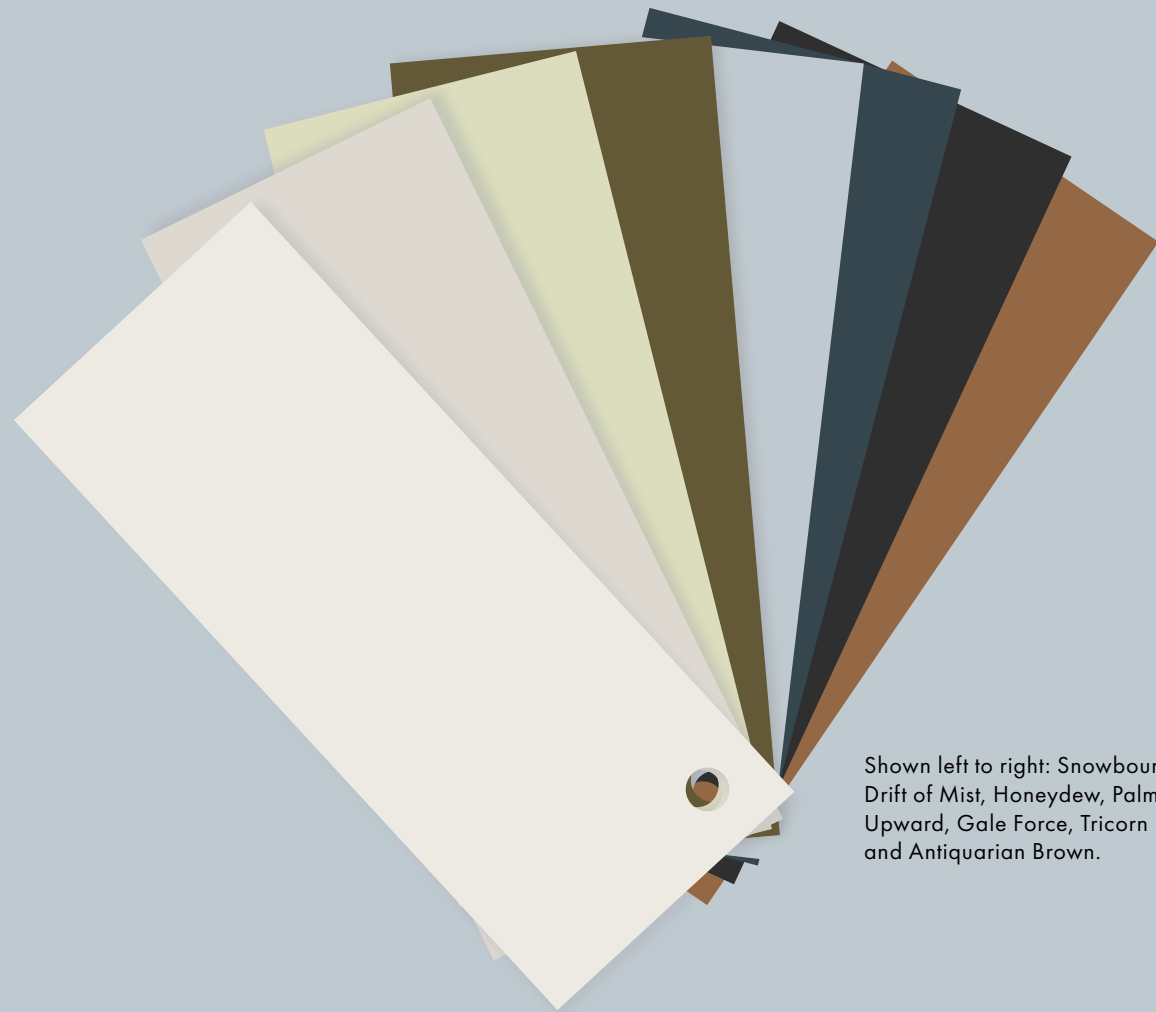


Olive green was the perfect choice for the new windows and doors on Justina Blakeney's LA home. As a multidisciplinary artist, designer, and founder of Jungalow — a colorful, plant-filled, Bohemian home decor brand — her choice is no surprise. It makes for a perfect contrast with the rosy tones of her terra-cotta tile roof and brick patio, and looks fresh against the light stucco exterior. She chose E-Series patio doors and casement windows for their narrow sight lines, which let the light pour in. This styling along with the array of color choices available made E-Series the ideal choice for her home, which strikes a balance between traditional Spanish Colonial Revival and bright and airy Mid-Century Modern styles. CREATING A LOOK

Q: HOW DO I DECIDE ON A REPLACEMENT DOOR COLOR?

A: When it's time to replace windows and doors, it's often the door that's tackled first. After all, a nonfunctional door isn't something most of us can live with for long. If this is the position you find yourself in, here's how to make a color decision that'll make you happy as you work to gradually update your home's exterior:

1 MATCH YOUR LONG-TERM VISION
If you're trying to decide whether your door should match your current exterior or your long-term vision, go for the color that will match your vision. Windows and doors can last for decades, whereas a house may need to be repainted more frequently. This approach can help save you money in the long term.

2 CONSIDER FIXED FEATURES
Like windows and doors, features such as gutters, garage doors, and any stone or brick integrated into your home's facade are more permanent and serious investments — much more so than the paint coating the exterior. If you don't plan to update the fixed features, consider them when deciding on a color palette.

3 FOCUS YOUR INSPIRATION
Did you know certain colors are associated with specific architectural styles? There are also certain colors associated with various regions of the country. Use inputs like these to guide your search and avoid becoming overwhelmed. You could even start by simply walking around your neighborhood to observe the colors.

GRILLES

Grilles, muntins, dividers, and grids — there are a lot of different words for the bars that create ornamental patterns on windows and doors. Here's what you need to know.

Q: DO GRILLES GO WITH MY HOME?

A: While grilles are typically considered a more traditional design element on a door or window, they don't have to be. With the rise of transitional architecture, which blends elements from traditional architecture with more contemporary approaches, there's freedom to mix and match. For example, the specified equal light pattern trends more modern. You can even select different profile shapes and widths to further a particular look.

SEAMLESS SILLS 3 WAYS

A flush sill is often preferred, and there are ways to achieve this look even where a sill with drainage is needed. The key is to design for a flush effect right from the start. Depending on your particular situation, any one or a combination of the design approaches below might work.

LARGE OVERHANG

The weather protection provided by an overhang can sometimes allow for a flush sill in places where a sill with drainage would otherwise be required. Here, two MultiGlide™ Doors are protected by an overhang.

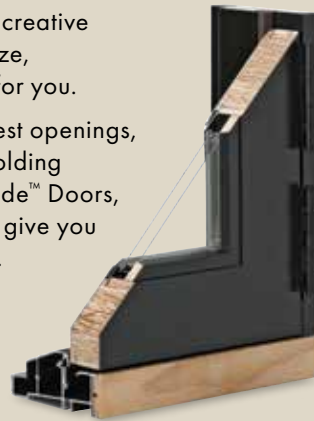



It's a blend of 40% wood fiber by weight, mostly reclaimed from Andersen manufacturing processes, with 60% thermoplastic polymer by weight, some of which is also reclaimed. Fibrex material retains its stability and rigidity in all climates — making it twice as strong as vinyl — so weathertight seals stay weathertight, blocking thermal transfer nearly 700 times better than aluminum to help reduce heating and cooling bills.


























Do I want a factory-applied paint color or wood stain, a custom color, or an unfinished door that can be stained or painted to match my existing woodwork? Do I need an option that'll allow me to choose one color on the exterior and another on the interior?

GRILLES:

Do I want grilles? If so, what pattern? How do I want them applied? Do I want the energy spacer bar available with full divided light grilles?

HARDWARE:

What style of hardware do I want? Would designer hardware suit my home? What finish will complement my door's paint color or wood stain?

PERFORMANCE:

Would I benefit from upgrading to triple-pane glass? Which Low-E glass option is right for my climate? What kind of sill does my climate require? What are my preferences for the look and function of a sill? What material is best for my home's style and my climate? What code requirements do I have to meet?
